I'VE GOT THE JOY, JOY, JOY, JOY DOWN IN MY HEART

Remember that old camp song? I can remember singing that song ever since I was a little kid! In Sunday School. In Bible Camp. Even in boy scout camp (a scout is reverent!). More fully, the lyrics go like this:

I've got the joy, joy, joy, joy

Down in my heart (Where?)

Down in my heart (Where?)

Down in my heart

I've got the joy, joy, joy, joy

Down in my heart

Down in my heart to stay

And I'm so happy

So very happy

I have the love of Jesus in my heart (down in my heart)

And I'm so happy

So very happy

I have the love of Jesus in my heart . . .

So, let me ask you today: Have you the joy, joy, joy, joy (of Jesus) down in YOUR heart?

As I wander somewhat purposefully (and sometimes aimlessly) through life, I meet a lot of people. A lot of church people. And a lot of Christian people. And I have to suggest, and conclude, that those who truly seem to have the joy, joy, joy, joy down in their heart are few and far between! Why is that? Why is it that we can't find more JOY in our journey with Jesus, the Joy-Giver?

Well, that is the topic for this Sunday, September 17th, as we learn more about DEEP FAITH (our new sermon series.)

The message is entitled 'DEEP JOY', and will provide three reasons why we can experience the JOY of JESUS, no matter what's going on around us.

Have you ever witnessed the rare bird (OK, rare human person) who seems to be able to experience JOY no matter what? I have. Right now, we are focused on several hurricanes, and the mop up efforts in Texas (Harvey) and Florida (Irma). You might see on the news a family or individual, in the aftermath of the storm, who are praising God, despite much damage to their personal property, because a) their family survived the storm, and b) the Lord has sent many loving people into their lives to help them recover.



I was part of one such disaster relief effort following Hurricane Katrina. Katrina arrived on our U. S. shores just three weeks after I was installed as Associate Pastor here at Salem on August 1st of 2005. Here is a synopsis of that storm from the online encyclopedia Wikipedia:

Katrina caused severe destruction along the Gulf coast from central Florida to Texas, much of it due to the storm surge and levee failure. Severe property damage occurred in coastal areas, such as Mississippi beachfront towns where boats and casino barges rammed buildings, pushing cars and houses inland; water reached 6–12 miles from the beach. The storm was the third most intense United States landfalling tropical cyclone, behind the 1935 Labor Day hurricane and Hurricane Camille in 1969. Overall, at least 1,245 people died in the hurricane and subsequent floods, making it the deadliest United States hurricane since the 1928 Okeechobee hurricane. Total property damage was estimated at \$108 billion, roughly four times the damage wrought by Hurricane Andrew in 1992 in the United States.

I became part of a relief effort led by our own Tim Wilmot that fall, a number of men and women from Salem and other area churches headed down to the gulf coast in Louisiana to help families impacted by the storm. We were working with Samaritan's Purse, a Christian relief agency headed by Franklin Graham (son of Rev. Billy Graham). We were housed in an area church in the evenings, and during the daylight hours we went out and mucked out damaged houses, ripped down wet drywall, treated soggy and moldy framing with a bleach solution, applied new roofs to houses that had lost their roofs, and created piles of junk for the trash collectors to eventually remove.

What we observed in several cases, were homeowners who were expressing the JOY, JOY, JOY, JOY of JESUS despite the personal calamity of having their homes very nearly destroyed by the hurricane, and by being made homeless for a long stretch... they were so thankful, and grateful, and expressing praise to the Lord for His goodness to them!

I wish more of us could experience that kind of DEEP FAITH and DEEP JOY - that lifts us up and beyond our circumstances. I wish we could mount another hands-on relief trip to Texas, or Florida, so that more of us can be blessed to become the hands and feet of Jesus, and to witness the powerful faith of those afflicted by these terrible storms!

So, how do we get that kind of overcoming faith that leads us into JOY? We need to go DEEP with the Lord. It may seem scary, or intimidating to go deeper with the Lord, to become more spiritually minded people than we currently are, but it is so blessed to get really close to Jesus!

And, clearly, this is what Jesus wants for us - His disciples. He wants us to experience TRUE JOY. No matter what. Hope to see you Sunday, 'Lord willing, and the creek don't rise!'



CONNECT TO SUNDAY SCHOOL

THIS SUNDAY: SUNDAY SCHOOL CONNECT!

This Sunday, at the beginning of the Sunday School hour (9:30 AM) we (adults) will all join together to hear an overview of each of the Sunday School classes that are available this fall. This represents the perfect opportunity to make a change, to play musical chairs, with no guilt, and no issues. Even in God's Word, King Solomon declares 'to everything there is a season . . . '

So, come Sunday morning at 9:30 AM, listen to the various Sunday School representatives, and let your heart determine your path . . . to Sunday School!

And, by the way, as pastors, we do recommend this 'second mile' of attending Sunday School. Sunday School is where we get close and personal with one another, and with God's Word. It's where we begin to feel like part of a caring family. It's the place where someone notices if you are missing, or sick, or going through hard times, and can therefore reach out to you when you need your church family the most. It's the place where we can be best held accountable for our walk with Christ - the place where we can perhaps open up about our struggles, and get some help and guidance in a caring, small group format. *Long story short: Sunday School! It's for everyone!*
