I will instruct you and teach you in the way you should go; I will counsel you with my loving eye over you . . . Psalm 32:8

OUCH!

Ouch! That hurt!

Sometimes, perhaps too often, we are wounded by the ones we love, the ones we thought loved us! As a pastor now for many years, I have heard so many stories of personal woundedness . . . and I confess to having felt wounded myself on any number of occasions . . . here's the shocking part by Christians!

Perhaps that's what makes it so painful when it does happen, because we sort of know - this isn't supposed to happen. Christians aren't supposed to hurt other



Christians. We are supposed to be family - brothers and sisters.

We have a new puppy now. His name is Oliver, or 'Ollie' for short. He's cute. He's a mix of Labrador retriever and miniature poodle, which is supposed to result in a dog which a) doesn't shed, b) doesn't bark much, c) has the fun loving personality of a lab (our last dog was a lab) and is about half the size of a lab. We love our new little puppy, Ollie. However, he BITES! He bites us - a lot. Well, I guess that is to be expected. He's only a puppy. He's exploring his whole world with his mouth. We are trying to teach him not to bite.

But we don't expect our brothers and sisters to in Christ bite us. When it happens, it can lead to tremendous pain, and deep disappointment in the quality of our fellowship. Often, when we are hurt in the church, and hurt by church people, it makes us want to run. To leave. Perhaps to find a better, more loving church to make our spiritual home.

Or, it may cause us to give up on church altogether. And that is sad. Because the church is the body of Christ. And of every social institution that is available to us today, the church is the one place where we are most likely to be loved, to be encouraged, to be schooled in how to please and follow Christ, and where we learn how to get home - to our eternal home.

So, how do we get people not to bite? Well, that can be a long, painful struggle. A puppy can outgrow its biting tendencies in a few short months. For some humans, it may take a whole lifetime. Jesus seems to advocate the direct approach - to help biters to learn not to. He essentially says, (paraphrasing here), *Go back to the one who bit you, and say "you bit me! That hurt!"*

And if that approach doesn't work, Jesus suggests getting more folks involved. Take one more with you, a witness. If that doesn't work, get the church involved. It's all laid out in the Gospel of Matthew, 18:15-17.

This is a complex issue today. So many people become offended - so easily. Often people take offense when no offense was actually intended. I myself have managed to offend any number of people over nearly 20 years of ministry. Never intentionally! But my offenses usually fit into these categories:

- ✓ Gaffs. Things said on the spur of the moment, without much forethought.
- ✓ Oversights. Things I forgot to do. Promises made, then forgotten in the heat of the battle.
- ✓ Humor. Especially humor that didn't strike someone's funny bone as very . . . humorous.
- ✓ Theology. People can be all over the map with what they think is the 'correct theology.'
- ✓ Insensitivity. Not noticing that people are hurting, or in need of help. (Although most never tell me!)

And, I suppose, there are many other ways I can and have offended people.

But what really grieves my heart, and you can see this in our nation today, people don't seem to get over being offended. They get offended, and they just want to roll with it. To stay angry. To maintain or increase distance. To engage in fight or flight.

This is not the biblical path. This is not the 'Jesus way.'

Jesus came to us - to earth - on a mission of reconciliation. Reconciliation! Big word! It means: *the ending of conflict or renewing of a friendly relationship between disputing people or groups.* Jesus came to bring to an end the family feud between God and His children. To remove the dividing wall of hostility. To deal with the problem of SIN, and that which has long separated us from God.


Yes, Jesus was an agent of reconciliation. And he also taught us about grace, and about forgiveness, very important and vital concepts in the life of Christian people.

And yet, when we, as Christians, get offended, it seems we forget. We forget reconciliation. We forget that this is part of our mission - the healing of relationships.

We forget forgiveness. We want to wallow in our pain, and never move on to healing, to forgiveness.

We want to forget grace (giving undeserved favor to people who have hurt us). We want to trade grace in on something darker, like retribution, or 'an eye for an eye.'

And this is the way the WORLD goes. You hurt me, I'm gonna hurt you! But as followers of Christ, we are to be different. Radically different. In fact, we are to show the world, by our love - our forgiving, healing, graceful love, that we are Christians - that we belong to Christ. And that belonging to Christ makes a difference in our lives.





If we fail in this, if we act like everybody else (an eye for an eye, an insult for an insult), we have just unraveled and voided our Christian witness. We have shown those watching (there are always those watching) that Christianity doesn't work. That belonging to Jesus makes no difference. That we are angry, reactive people just like everybody else.

As you know, part of my calling at Salem is for the REAL people of Jesus to emerge. REAL loving. REAL forgiving. REAL graceful. My vision is that when people come to Salem, they could REALLY see Christianity in action; the way it is supposed to work.

So, as we think about these things, two very basic thoughts from your pastor:

1) Don't bite.

2) If you get bit, work towards healing. Handle offenses the way Jesus taught.

May the Lord bless you as you do these things!

MESSAGE PREVIEW, THIS SUNDAY: DEEP CLEANSING

This first Sunday of October (welcome to Autumn, by the way!), we are continuing to explore deep faith, as we open God's Word to examine the idea of deep cleansing.

I think as Americans, we generally like the idea of being clean, of cleanliness. I know many of you have very clean, well organized homes. I have been impressed! Some have perfectly orderly and weed free gardens.



As for myself, I like to have a clean car - that should be no surprise to anyone. In fact, for years, before our family embarks on any big trip, I will go to some pains to wash the car, clean the interior, and create a pleasant environment in which to travel. And my DW (dear wife) for years wondered to me why I bother to do that: "It's only going to get dirty anyway!" And my answer is "I don't know. I just like to travel in a clean car!"

Well, God wants us to be clean. And to stay clean. Probably a better biblical term might be holiness, or righteousness. God's Word is pretty clear, we are to walk away from the old, dirty, dark life, into a new life that is clean, and bright, and unstained by ongoing, intentional sin.

So, we are encouraged to 'come clean' and go deeper with the Lord.

I have often wondered why more people don't go deeper with the Lord. And I have come to see the answer. It's sin. Sin creates a wall. Sin creates an impulse within us that makes us want to hide from the Lord - and not get too near to Him. Sin creates in us the same reaction as was experienced by Adam and Eve when they sinned. What happened? They went against God, and sinned, and discovered, to their shock, that they were naked. And they hid from God. They were ashamed to be in His holy presence. They were dirty now. Well, the dirtiness of sin is a problem that plagues all of us. We will learn, should we choose to honor God with our presence on Sunday, that sin takes two forms. One we have little control over - the sin nature. It's just part of who we are. The second - sinful actions - we have a lot of control over.

So if we have sin problem, we shouldn't feel too awkward about that; we all have a sin problem. God's Word says so!

But we shouldn't ignore our sin problem either. God has provided the solution, in His son Jesus. We can be made clean. And we can be made comfortable to get close to God. We don't have to spend our lives hiding from Him. Deep cleansing is possible!

I will have some stories from the annals of Hollywood film making to share, and we will be having communion on Sunday. So come, learn about cleansing. The Lord has shown me some good news, I'd like to share it with you!
